We are proposing to reintroduce the Kinesiology major (and it's minor) after a 2 year absence from the catalog

Rationale within departmental and collegiate context and based on assessment results:

The Kinesiology major was removed from the catalog two years ago due to staffing and enrollment issues. We believe that it is now appropriate to bring the major back. Kinesiology is one of the fastest growing majors in the country, and will be a popular choice of major among the growing number of student athletes at Hendrix. Student surveys show a strong interest in returning the major with expressed interest in both the education and sports management tracks that are in this proposal. In addition, many prospective students have been disappointed by the lack of a Kinesiology major at the College, negatively impacting our ability to recruit these students, particularly student athletes.

Among the problems which led to the major being withdrawn were too few faculty in the Department, a lack of scientific rigor in the major, failure to sequence courses appropriately and shortfalls in preparing students for their career choices. Sufficient staff with appropriate expertise are now in the Department to allow us to address these problems. Between some changes that were implemented last year and others that are part of this proposal, we have added science prerequisites to appropriate courses, installed sequencing as necessary and added Directed Research to the major. Directed Research was already required for Allied Health majors; its addition to the Kinesiology major will make the two majors more comparable strengthen the experience of Kinesiology majors significantly. These changes necessitate increasing the number of required courses in the major to 13, which is the same number required for the Allied Health major.

Our proposal includes the addition of one new course, Coaching Fall Sports. This course will actually replace 4 existing courses on coaching of basketball, swimming, volleyball and football. The proposal for this course will be submitted separately.

The proposed minor is very similar to the previous Kinesiology minor other than some changes to allow students more flexibility in getting the particular courses they need.

Proposers are welcome to attach additional documentation for more complex proposals, such as the addition of a major or minor.

Kinesiology Major

A major in Kinesiology consists of 13 courses (9 core courses, 3 courses from an emphasis area, and 1 elective) and 6 physical activity classes, at least one chosen from each of the following categories: fitness, team sport, individual sport, aquatics, and dance. The emphasis areas are Secondary Physical Education, Elementary Physical Education, Sports Management and Recreation Leadership.

Senior Capstone Experience

Kinesiology majors will choose from one of the following categories, and then culminate the experience with a project, a paper on the project, and a formal presentation. The Directed Research course (KINE 410) is designed to teach the skills necessary for successful completion of the Capstone experience and should be taken prior to starting the Capstone project. The Capstone grade will be an average of the paper and presentation grades. All projects must be approved by the Kinesiology Department prior to the start of the project.

Senior capstone experience options:

- Pedagogical: This option will be based on student teaching or other instructional experience and includes a paper relating to current teaching issues or trends in physical education. May also include journals of experiences, and other relevant learning experiences.
- Research Project: This option includes completion of an applied research project in Kinesiology.
- Internship: This option includes maintaining a journal of relevant learning experiences, a paper, and a presentation based on the internship experience.
