Interdisciplinary Major Proposal: Social Justice

Justification

The proposed Social Justice Major is designed to provide me with the resources I need to understand and work towards the conditions of equal social opportunity. The major will allow me to study the meaning of justice from a philosophical standpoint, as well as give me a healthy foundation of knowledge on the social and political structures in which poverty and other social inequalities exist. The purpose of this body of knowledge is to develop a method of analyzing existing social and political structures in order to “theorize about practical ways to create a fair and just society.” In addition to theory, the major will also focus on a method of living social justice on a day to day basis through service or other alternative methods. To do this I have divided the major into three categories which will increase my understanding of: the individuals and groups who are not receiving a fair distribution of the burdens and benefits of society, how to promote social opportunity, and the meaning of social justice.

The classes can be divided into three categories: Theory and Philosophy, Sociology and History, and Political Science. The first of these three categories pulls classes from the Philosophy department, the Religious Studies department, and the Sociology department. These classes were chosen because they offer the critical thinking experience and the theoretical background required to analyze ethical dilemmas and social forces, determine just outcomes, and actively live social justice. The second category is comprised of Sociology and History courses chosen to build a background of general knowledge about the communities that suffer from social injustice. The third category, Political Science, draws from politics courses to provide a basic understanding of the World’s political powers and the role the government plays/ has played in promoting or repressing social justice.

By combining the disciplines of philosophy, sociology, history, and politics, I hope to prepare for a life of active social justice which may lead me to a career in development, social work, community organizing, law, or public policy/public service.


Capstone Experience
