SUWANEE, Ga. – There is a familiar feeling heading into the 2009 Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference soccer season. Trinity University finished fifth in the nation a year ago and has now won seven straight SCAC titles. The Texas Tigers will certainly be the favorite headed into this season, however, San Antonio is not the only place where excitement abounds heading into the 2009 campaign.

The SCAC looks to continue the success which has been building each season following the league's expansion to 10 schools in 1998. Over the past ten seasons, the conference standings have shown at least four teams with ten or more wins at season's end. But even that sustained top-to-bottom excellence has not resulted in a bevy of tournament bids for the membership. In fact, the league has produced only one representative to the NCAA tournament over the last eight years.

But as familiar as things may seem, ten members of the All-SCAC first team graduated in 2008 – the largest number of seniors ever represented on the team since the SCAC reorganized in 1991. New faces coupled with key veterans should make the league as competitive as ever and generate another opportunity for the SCAC to shine in the national spotlight for yet another year.

Paul McGinlay, the 2008 SCAC Coach-of-the-Year, begins his 19th season as the head coach of Trinity University. McGinlay is a 10-time SCAC Coach of the Year honoree and has led his team to an undefeated and untied conference mark seven times in his career. With his Tigers coming off yet another quarterfinal appearance in the national tournament, Trinity has advanced to the Elite Eight in four of the last six seasons. The Tigers carry a pre-season number five ranking and, as always, the expectations will be high in San Antonio in 2009. Trinity has its work cut out with the loss of four all-Americans due to graduation: Tyrone Petrakis, Michael Robertson, Noe Casanova (2008 SCAC Player-of-the-Year) and Patrick Floeck. Trinity was the only school in Division III to have four players receive all-American honors last season. Floeck graduates after leading the league in goals scored each of the last two years and finished his career as the fifth-most prolific scorer in SCAC history (53 goals). Even with the loss of four all-Americans, the Tigers return eight starters including Ben Grossman. Grossman, a first team All-SCAC performer last year, scored 13 goals (four game-winners) and dished out four assists for 30 points.

For the third straight year Southwestern University finished second in the SCAC and came up just short of a bid to the NCAA tournament. Don Gregory, now in his 12th season in Georgetown, has a career record of 114-82-16 (57-36-8 in league play). The Pirates welcome back six starters, including captains Davy Lozano (2008 First Team All-SCAC), Nathan Shaw-Meadow and Josh Spencer (2008 Second Team All-SCAC). With a blend of new talent mixed with the experienced returnees, Southwestern is poised for another successful season with the ultimate goal of earning the program's first-ever trip to the NCAA Tournament.

Centre College is coming off a year that saw the Colonels earn the program's most wins since 2000 and the most wins in a single season for head coach Jeb Burch since taking the reins in 2002. Danville, Kentucky. Centre looks to run its consecutive winning season streak to 21 in 2009, but will have to work hard after the loss of five seniors from last year's 15-5-0 squad. This year's version of the Colonels will be a veteran group with nine seniors returning for their final season of collegiate athletics. Three all-conference performers return - including Aaron Arndt, Chris Allen and Richard Hinton. Arndt will anchor the backfield from his goalkeeper position after posting a .783 save percentage (fourth in the SCAC) and six shutouts (second in the SCAC). Allen, who was named third team All-SCAC, added a goal and two assists from his midfield position. Hinton scored six goals, and tallied six assists (sixth in the SCAC) for a total of 18 points (ninth in the SCAC) from his forward position. With returning experience and 11 talented newcomers, the Colonels are primed to make a run at the school's first NCAA tournament berth since 1999.

Horst Richardson returns for his 44th season and third in the SCAC as the head coach of Colorado College. Richardson is just four wins shy of the 500th for his storied career. The Tigers are determined to make an appearance in the NCAA tournament but know they must improve in the month of November where Colorado College is just 8-7-1 over the past seven seasons. Fortunately, the Tigers appear to have all the tools necessary to maintain a consistent effort throughout the year. Colorado has seven seniors to provide leadership, eight of its top 11 point producers from a year ago and a goaltender who ranked among the Division III leaders in both goals-against average and saves percentage. Expectations are high at the base of Pikes Peak and the Tigers have their eyes set on a berth in the 2009 NCAA tournament.

Things could not have been any tighter last year for first-year head coach Brad Hauter of DePauw University. The Indiana Tigers tied six games and competed in nine others that were decided by one goal. DePauw returns a slew of experience, including 15 letterwinners and eight starters. Included among those eight starters is the entire defensive backline that ranked 21st nationally in goals against average. To complement a veteran backline, the Tigers also return the 2008 SCAC Defensive Player of the Year in Ted Jacobi. The senior goalkeeper was in goal for all but 45 minutes in 2008 and posted a 0.63 goals against average (second in the SCAC), which ranked 24th in the nation. His .878 saves percentage (second in the SCAC) was seventh in Division III and he recorded a league-best nine shutouts. If DePauw can find a way to shore up its offensive output; Coach Hauter's Tigers will be fighting to find a spot back in the NCAA tournament for the first time since 2000.

There is a strong sense of excitement in Jackson, Mississippi this season as Millsaps College returns eight starters from a team that won more games in conference play than any other Majors' team since 1996. Coach Lee Johnson enters his seventh year at the helm and invites thirteen newcomers to the program. Offensively, the Majors set school records for goals scored (51), assists (34) and total points (136) in 2008. Coach Johnson will have to find an answer early on for replacing second team All-SCAC and third team All-South Central Region forward Anthony Amaya, who provided much of that offensive firepower a year ago. With the pieces assembled, Millsaps has reason to believe that this is the year the program can snap its 12-year losing streak, which dates to 1996.

The winningest coach in school history, Andy Marcinko returns for his 19th season at Rhodes College. The Lynx will return nineteen players (seven starters) and welcome fourteen new faces to Memphis this year. Logan Eberly returns as one of those leaders. He was named to the All-SCAC second team a year ago after scoring eight goals (fifth in the SCAC) and adding an assist to lead the Lynx in points with 17 from his forward position. Finishing at 11-7-1, last season was an uptick for Rhodes, however Coach Marcinko and the Lynx will look to get back into the top four of the conference for the first time since 2004.

Head Coach Mark Hudson's second year at the helm of Austin College saw the 'Roos improve by a margin of five wins, more than any other school in the SCAC after posting a record of 7-10-1 in 2008. The story from last year's team was youth – none more evident than the play of Luis Castillo, who was named second team All-SCAC as well as the league's Newcomer-of-the-Year after leading the 'Roos in goals scored (7), assists (4) and total points (18). A year older, Austin College is looking to turn some heads in 2009 and has hopes of its best league finish since joining the SCAC in 2006.

Oglethorpe University hopes to continue the success it showed late in the 2008 season as the Stormy Petrels picked up wins in five of their last six games. Head Coach Jon Akin, now entering his seventh season, will certainly have his challenges with just four upperclassmen and twenty one new faces added to the program. Oglethorpe, which has posted three 11+ win seasons in the past five, is poised with a blend of young talent and key leadership to make a run and compete at the top of the SCAC in 2009.

This season will mark the 41st anniversary of soccer on the Mountain at The University of the South-Sewanee. Head Coach David Poggi returns for his third season and will have work to do as the Tigers will have to blend key leadership roles with a great deal of young talent. Like most teams in the SCAC, this year's edition of the Tigers will be fairly young with the addition of sixteen new faces. Sewanee does return its top point scorer from a year ago in sophomore forward Matt Lightfoot who scored five goals and added four assists while being named third team All-SCAC. The Purple Tigers feel with the right chemistry blend that this team can get back to becoming a winning program – something that has not been seen on the Mountain since 2004.

Hendrix College Head Coach Doug Mello returns for his second year with the Warriors and is excited to see the improvement his team has made from a year ago. The Warriors, who lost five games last year by one goal, return seven seniors to lead a squad that was extremely young last season. With the additional year of experience and maturity for a team that at times started nine freshman in 2008, this year's team is excited about the opportunity to become the first winning men's team at Hendrix since 1993.

In his 27th season as the head coach of Birmingham-Southern College, Preston Goldfarb welcomes back fourteen players to a team that had just one returning starter in 2008. The 2008 season saw the Panthers lose nine one-goal games – thanks in huge part to its youth. Coach Goldfarb invites fourteen new faces to join this year's team that looks to combine with its veteran leadership in an attempt to get back to the winning ways people have grown accustomed to on the Hilltop.

Austin College

Kangaroos



After improving by five wins in the second year under coach Mark Hudson, the Austin College men's soccer team will be looking to take the next step in challenging within the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference in the 2009 season. Last year the team finished with an overall record of 7-10-1, including a 4-7 mark in SCAC play.

Last year was a youth movement for the 'Roos, as several first and second year players developed into impact players as the season progressed. Chief among those talented newcomers was Luis Castillo, who was named 2nd Team All-SCAC as well as the SCAC Newcomer of the Year after leading the 'Roos in goals (7), assists (4) and total points (18) in his first season at Austin College.

Castillo got some help from fellow first year players Chris Stein and Sam Temple last season, along with current junior Garrett Evans. Evans scored three goals and had three assists, Temple scored three times and Stein added two goals and tied for the team lead with four assists.

Also back this year is senior Alex Dawson, an All-Conference selection who scored twice and had four assists a year ago. A proven goal scorer in the SCAC, Dawson will once again be leaned on to help shoulder the offensive load for the 'Roos in the upcoming year.

Manning the net full time this season after sharing goalkeeper duties a year ago is sophomore Grant Gosselin, who showed flashes of brilliance in his freshman campaign and had four shutouts. Gosselin made 55 saves in 11 appearances last season to finish among the SCAC leaders in saves per game.

Gosselin will get some help defensively from sophomore Johnny Lara, who started 12 games a season ago, as well as Kyle Fitzpatrick and Michael Cline. Cline returns to the team after taking a year off and his fearless and physical play should bolster an already talented back line for the 'Roos.

The 'Roos will have a difficult time replacing the leadership of departed seniors like Miles Vaughn and Tommy Haney, but between the young returning cast as well as an influx of newcomers that have helped make this one of the largest squads in recent Austin College soccer history, the team seems to have what it takes to turn some heads in the SCAC this fall.

2009 Preview

Birmingham-Southern College Panthers



Beginning his 27th season directing the Birmingham-Southern Men's Soccer program, Preston Goldfarb sees another young team, but one with much more experience than the 2008 squad. The experience came at a tough cost. A season record of four wins and 16 losses saw many new faces on the field.

In 2008, the team lost nine one-goal games and its youthfulness played a big role in those harsh results. The 2009 squad is still a young team. With only two seniors, the heavy load of leading BSC out of a losing season will fall heavily on five juniors and seven sophomores returning. They will not be alone, however, as Coach Goldfarb added 14 newcomers to the lineup.

Forward: The Panthers return three veteran strikers to the pitch this season. Sophomore Garner Shivers led BSC in points (15), shots (51), shots on goal (26), and goals (6) last season. Sophomore Tyler Evans was right behind him tied at 15 points, 36 shots (all 36 of them on goal), and second in total goals with five. Kenan LeParc (Paris, France) also returns for the Panthers for his first full season at BSC. Coach Goldfarb has also added four new strikers to the mix this season. Jonathan Alexander (The Altamont School, Birmingham), Antonio Castanon (The Heritage School, Atlanta), Eric Lyerly (Hoover, Ala.) and Kyle Sherrin (Fairhope, Ala.)

Midfield: The midfield at BSC Soccer Park will have much more experience than last year's squad. The Panthers return Sean Head, Andrew Shelton, Carter McLean, Stephen Rumble, and Brice Hunt, all of whom played in at least 18 of the Panthers' 20 matches last season. Additions in the middle include Jarred Brookins (Vestavia, Ala.), Tony Crocker (Appalachian State), and two international players, Nicolas Reitmeier (Germany), and Stuart Weekes (Barbados).

Defense: Scott Shelton, Andrew Stein, and Michael Alfano return to the back field this season after starting a majority of the games last season. Newcomers Henley Carr (Hoover, Ala.), Nathan Haywood (Fairhope, Ala.), Artem Joukov (Alabama Math and Science, Gulf Shores), and Alex Perrotta (The Marist School, Atlanta) will supplement this position.

Goalkeeper: The Panthers have a big void to fill with the departure of senior keeper Hal Halbert off last year's team. Shachar Hovan saw action in seven games last season with three starts, but in those seven games he tallied 25 saves. That averages out to a save percentage of .806, allowing just six goals (1.44 GAA) in his outings.

Shachar will not be alone in the net this season with the addition of two promising freshmen. Charlie Boles (George Jenkins High, Brandon, Fla.) and Clint Lum (Pearland, Texas).

2009 Preview Centre College Colonels



After seeing the graduation of 5 seniors who shared an overall record of 54-16-6, the 2009 Centre College men's soccer team will look to extend its consecutive winning-seasons streak to 21 as the Colonels have reloaded with an incoming class of 11 freshmen.

The Colonels, who finished with a 15-5 record in their 2008 campaign, will be led by a strong class of nine seniors. All-Conference players Chris Allen (MF, Louisville KY), Aaron Arndt (GK, Madisonville KY), and Richard Hinton (FOR, Fort Wayne IN) will be joined by James Kusak (MF, Louisville KY), JC Spalding (GK, New Haven KY), Alex Wegener (MF, Columbia MO), Patrick Garvey (MF, Louisville KY), Andy Howard (MF, Lexington KY), Pat Hall (MF, Indianapolis IN), Harry Gerard (MF, Haiti) and 2008 All-SCAC Sportsmanship Team member Andy Burke (DEF, Cincinnati OH) to create the core of the 2009 squad.

The sophomore class of the Colonels, led by second-year forward Austin Hall (FOR, Indianapolis IN) will enter the season with extremely high expectations. Along with Hall, Tony Distler (DEF, Louisville KY), Cameron Bayse (MF, Louisville KY), Brian Fay (DEF, New York NY) and Ben Van Nevel (FOR, Louisville KY) will all be expected to contribute greatly in their second seasons in a Centre uniform.

The Colonels junior class, paced by Brad Fansher (DEF, Arlington Heights IL) and Alex Murphy (DEF, Madison IN), are joined by 11 new faces this fall to complete the roster of the Centre College men's soccer team. Four of the first-years – Ryan Garvey (FOR, Louisville KY), Will Frentz (MF, Louisville KY), Josh Settle (MF, Bowling Green KY), and Austin Greer (MF, Bowling Green KY) – come to pre-season just two weeks after playing for the USYSA U-18 National Championship in Boston, MA, finishing runner-up in the prestigious competition. They are joined by high school standouts Aldyn Royes (MF, Norcross GA), Patrick Deffendall (DEF, Hendersonville TN) and five more newcomers who will all fight for playing time in their first seasons.

While several unknowns exist with this year's 2009 squad, the talent level and depth of the team shows great promise for a program that has finished in the top 3 of the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference each of the past four years. Expectations are at an all-time high as Head Coach Jeb Burch enters his eighth season at the helm.

"We realize as a group that we can't change the past. But we can certainly do something about these upcoming matches and season. One of the four home games will be against Austin College, led by former Centre assistant Mark Hudson, as part of the third annual Susan G. Komen for the Cure game, a charity event for the fight against breast cancer. Centre will then head south to battle against the likes of Trinity University and Southwestern University, before coming home for a pair of home games and rounding out the year with the season-finale away to Depauw University on November 7th.

Colorado College

Tigers



The Colorado College men's soccer team has been a model of consistency.

During the last seven seasons, the Tigers have posted a 94-41-7 record, a .687 winning percentage, and averaged just over 13 victories per season.

In two seasons as a member of the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference, CC has finished with league marks of 13-7 and 13-6-1, which put the Tigers in a three-way tie for third place in 2007 and then fourth in 2008.

Colorado College has been at its best during the early portion of its schedule, posting a 46-16-4 record and .727 winning percentage during the months of August and September.

But a combined 8-7-1 mark during the month of November, which includes a 2-2 record each of the last two seasons, has consistently kept the Tigers from achieving their primary goal – earning a berth in the NCAA Tournament.

Fortunately, the Tigers appear to have all the tools necessary to maintain a consistent effort throughout the year. They have seven seniors to provide leadership, eight of their top 11 point producers from a year ago and a goaltender who ranked among the Division III leaders in both goals-against average and saves percentage.

The offense will feature senior forward/captain Trevor Cobb, who has 22 career goals and 16 assists and led the Tigers in total points during each of his first three seasons. The first-team all-SCAC selection scored four of his seven career game-winning goals in 2008 and assisted on four other game winners.

Senior forward Jordan Reese set career highs with seven goals and 17 points last season. He too has been a fixture among CC's top three scoring leaders since his freshman campaign when he had a team-leading six assists, three of them on game-winning goals. Reese enters his final campaign with 14 career goals and 12 assists.

Coming off a break-out season in 2008, senior Brendan Douglas established career highs with seven goals and three assists to finish tied for third on the team with 17 points. He notched the team's only hat trick of the year during the 11-0 victory over Cornell College.

Senior Chris Ellis struck for a career-high four goals and will give CC additional firepower in the midfield.

Senior midfielder Ben Hancock tallied three goals and a pair of assists during his career, but after a brilliant effort in Brazil, appears ready to make his final season a memorable one.

The team also will be counting on senior David Van Sicklen, who enters his final campaign with five career goals and an assist.

"If the seniors perform, we'll have opportunities galore," Richardson said. "We also have talented juniors and sophomores backing them up."

The junior class includes Nicky Anastas, Kevin Ecke, and Sandy Feuer at the offensive end, along with Wil Nelp, who will anchor the defense.

The sophomore class includes midfielder Chris Lutz, and defenders Warren King and Chris Walker.

While the defense will have a new look, the Tigers boast a pair of battle-tested goalkeepers in senior Brian Engle and junior Andy McGhie. Engle, a first-team all-SCAC selection, led the league with a 0.45 goals-against average and .886 saves percentage. He tied for second with six shutouts despite playing in only 11 games.

Injuries limited McGhie to just two appearances in 2008, but he posted a 2-2 record the year before.

"Brian is working hard to be even more athletic and agile," said assistant coach James Wagenschutz, who works with the team's goalkeepers. "He needs to continue to show the kind of drive that got him where he is."

"Andy was injured last year, but he has amazing athleticism and a desire to compete. He's looking forward to the opportunity to make his mark."

In addition to three first-year keepers Dan Eppstein, Brian Graf and Forrest Marowitz, 14 other newcomers will attempt to earn a spot on the roster when pre-season training begins on Aug. 22.

Players with the potential to contribute during their first season include defender Nick Lammers and midfielders Joel Dungan, Matt Fechter and Anthony Hyatt.

The 2009 campaign begins on Sept. 4 when the Tigers play host to Fontbonne University. The eight-game season-opening home stand includes visits by cross-town rival CU-Colorado Springs and Montclair State University, which was ranked No. 3 in Division III for most of the 2008 campaign.

Tigers



The Tigers return 15 letterwinners including eight who started at least 10 games for last year's 8-4-6 team. In addition to the six ties last year, nine other matches were decided by one goal each. In addition to the veterans returning, DePauw will welcome a large recruiting class.

"We have an outstanding group of players coming in and I am excited about having the opportunity to work with them," second-year head coach Brad Hauter said.

DePauw ranked 21st in Division III last year in goals against average and returns all of the starters in the back.

Hendrix College head men's soccer coach Doug Mello is anxious to get his team back on the field after pulling in another talented class of incoming freshman and bringing back a strong group of returners.

Mello enters his second year at the helm after ushering in a new era of Hendrix men's soccer in 2008. The Warriors finished last year with a 5-12 overall record (five losses by 1-0 score) and 2-8 Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC) mark. [Jon] Moore garnered both conference wins with key saves against Millsaps College and Oglethorpe University. [Kent] Coombs always gives 100 percent and is a solid defender," said Mello.

Mac Barnes (Little Rock, Ark.) is the lone junior on the 2009 roster, while Mello's first recruiting class returns 11 sophomores. Ryan Menchaca (San Antonio, Texas) and Duncan Keegan (Signal Mountain, Tenn.) are key returners this year after starting 16 games as freshman and earning the team's defensive and offensive most valuable player awards, respectively.

"[Ryan] Menchaca is the defensive anchor who attacks out of the back field, while [Duncan] Keegan is a cheeky midfielder who takes opponents on and makes things happen," stated Mello.

[Brice] Zaballa returns fresh and ready for action after an injury plagued 2008 season, while [Karl] Heinbockel will be expected to shore up our back line and add a level of maturity to our young squad. [Adam] Legg is back and ready to go after a shoulder injury midway through last season put a halt to his freshman year. Legg spent the summer playing for the Springfield Demize in the Premiere Developmental League." Mello commented.

Mello's second recruiting class features 11 freshman who will be called upon to adjust to the college game quickly and make an immediate impact on the field. Mello focused his attention on some of Central Arkansas' local talent by bringing in a key member of the 2008 Arkansas Athletic Association (AAA) Class 7A State Champion Little Rock Catholic H.S. team and a pair of players from the 2008 AAA Class 7A Runner-Up Conway H.S. team. "[Kevin] Gregory is a big and strong defender who will shore up the middle of the pitch with his aggressive style of play. [Rob] Weingold's field vision and ability to take on opponents will be an added dimension to our midfield," stated Mello.

"Overall, this class of recruits will add to the foundation of young and talented players we will build our squad around. Look for us to score more goals and challenge every team until the final whistle," Mello commented.

Millsaps College

Majors



With eight starters returning, including a pair of Third Team All-SCAC selections from a year ago, the Millsaps men's soccer team will look to snap a streak of 12 consecutive losing seasons dating back to 1997 and continue its improvement as of late.

The loss of four senior starters to graduation, including Second Team All-SCAC and Third Team All-South Central Region forward Anthony Amaya, leaves big voids to be filled all around the field, but seventh-year head coach Lee Johnson welcomes in 13 newcomers in 2009. The talented class will add strength and depth to an already talented roster, which includes 16 letterwinners from a year ago.

"I'm nervous, but excited about the season because of the expectations we have," Johnson said. "We could either come out and surprise some people or not capitalize on opportunities and lose some games we think we should win. Either way, I'm looking forward to starting the season."

Millsaps has steadily improved the past two seasons both overall and in league play, going 9-11 last year (the third most wins in school history) after winning just two games in 2006 (2-16-1). The Majors' 5-5 mark in SCAC games and sixth place finish tied a school record of wins, while six one-goal losses kept it from being a breakout year.

The 2008 season also produced one of the most prolific offensive teams in over a decade, setting new school records in goals scored (51), total points (136) and assists (34), while scoring 2.55 goals-per-game and giving up just 2.15 (6th, single-season).

Entering his seventh year at the helm of the men's soccer program with a 31-75-3 overall record, Johnson realizes that this could be a very special season. Adding two new assistant coaches just before fall camp, including a goalkeepers coach, the Majors will have veteran leadership both on the staff and the field.

Offensively, Millsaps returns five of six starters on the attack, including Corey Beaumont, Aaron Hyatt, Drew Dews, Colin Thompson and Phil Guillot. The five-man unit combined for 29 of the Majors' 51 goals, 16 of 35 assists and five game-winning goals in 2008. Seniors Justin Burns and Andres Colocho can also move up in the offensive third and provide some scoring.

Defensively, the Majors return three of their four starting backs in Brandon Mong, Conley Pomerence and Drew Moroux, and most likely a goalkeeper who started seven games last year. Mong is coming off All-SCAC third team honors and ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District VI honors a year ago, and will have a chance to finish his Millsaps career in the Top 5 of a few school records.

One of several holes to be filled will be at the goalkeeper spot, as four-year letterwinner Domenick DiPaolo has graduated. DiPaolo finished his Millsaps career with solid numbers between the posts, racking up 193 saves (5th, career), a 2.5 GAA (t-6th, career) and 4.7 saves-per-game (t-8th, career). Candidates for the position include sophomore Dylan Broussard, who started seven games as a freshman last year, and newcomers John Robertson and Stephen Andrieu. The trio will be under the guidance of first year goalkeepers coach, Ed Moore, from St. Mary's College (Calif.).

"The starting goalkeeper position will go to the player that gives our team the best chance to win," Johnson said. "We feel that we have some good candidates for the position. Now it's a matter of seeing who steps up to the challenge."

Millsaps' 2009 schedule looks to be very challenging, with a late reward of playing eight of its final 12 games at home. Of the Majors' non-conference opponents, six of eight are away from Harper Davis Field including the first three on the road at Louisiana College, the University of Dallas and Rust College.

"The early season schedule will hopefully provide us some confidence heading into league play," Johnson said. "Closing out with eight of the last 12 at home, that gives us the opportunity to build up a good fan base and have a good home atmosphere if we're doing well. Those things are crucial having some of the conference's top teams like Trinity, Southwestern, Colorado College and Rhodes coming here."

Millsaps kicks off the season on Tuesday, Sept. 1 at 5 p.m. at Louisiana College.

The 2009 Oglethorpe University men's soccer team, led by head coach Jon Akin, will be looking to build on late season success from the 2008 campaign as they head into 2009. After stumbling to a 2-8-3 record in the team's first 13 games of 2008, the squad rallied to claim five of their last six contests to finish at a respectable 7-9-3 on the season. Coach Akin attributes the late season surge of 2008 to chemistry finally being struck between the front and back lines, and he imagines more of the same forward momentum carrying over into 2009.

With only two seniors and two juniors on the 2009 roster, coach Akin will be balancing the talents of a score of young players. The 2009 squad will feature 21 new faces on a roster that will feature over 40 eligible players. With this influx of talent, Akin will be employing a reserve team for the first time in school history that assistant coach and former player, Michael Muller, will coach.

"I'm really pleased with our recruiting efforts," said coach Akin, adding, "it's a luxury to have a talent pool this deep and I think it could be the beginning of some big things on Salamone Field."

Senior goalkeeper Michael Hadjisimos will be called upon for leadership duties along with juniors Bryan Burnick and Evan Britton. Last season, Hadjisimos ranked second in the SCAC amongst goalkeepers with 92 saves and third overall in conference in saves per game at 5.11. It will be critical for the handful of experienced players to show the younger freshmen and sophomores the proverbial "ropes" as the schedule is loaded with big dates.

Action begins for the Stormy Petrels at 4:00 p.m. on September 1 as they will host Brewton-Parker on Salamone Field. After a series on non-conference matches, Oglethorpe begins SCAC play in earnest when Centre and DePauw come calling the weekend of September 25. The team will celebrate Youth Soccer Month on September 27 with a free soccer clinic prior to the contest with DePauw and will host games versus Millsaps and Birmingham-Southern on October 2 and 4 for Oglethorpe University Parents Weekend.

Sewanee – University of the South Tigers



The 2009 Sewanee Tigers enter the season with a mix of experience and young talent needed to achieve the level of success both desired and expected by a program rich in tradition. The present and future for Sewanee Soccer looks very promising.

The team is led by three determined seniors who enjoy playing and are capable of having "break-out" senior years. Patrick Johnson, Matt O'Brien, and Henry Kiser are very different types of players both in roles and personalities. "Together, they will provide leadership from their experiences and the necessary energy, effort, and dedication to achieve goals yet to be attained," said Head Coach David Poggi. A positive start will help the team's confidence. What's important is for the team to remain excited, together and strong - especially when adversity is faced.

The Tigers have a record 16 newcomers in this year's recruiting class. The addition of 12 rising sophomores, who gained valuable experience last year speaks well for the future of Sewanee Soccer. "This is a talented group which has the potential to do great things, we just need to be patient and remain focused," reminds Poggi.

Matt Hale returns after starting a career high nine games as a freshman last season. He finished the year ranked eighth in the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference with 31 saves, second in goals-against-average (0.54), fourth in shutouts (4), and first in save percentage (.912). In all games played, Matt ranked fourth in the SCAC with a 0.89 goals-against-average.

"Matt gained tremendous experience in his freshman year. He has a fantastic work ethic and seldom gets rattled," said Poggi.

Freshmen Freddie Delchamps and Chris Grover will provide Sewanee with perhaps the youngest and potentially the best goalkeepers in the SCAC for the next four years. "With Matt, Freddie, and Chris, I feel we will be in every game regardless of which one is between the posts," said Poggi.

At first glance, with only one upperclassman returning who was a regular starter in last year's backline, one might wonder if this could be the Tigers "Achilles Heel" in '09. However, Coach Poggi is quick to point out that in addition to Junior Matt Engle (18 games played in '08) a solid group of Sophomores led by Walt Doty, Will Morgan, Mark Meyer, and Alec Peter saw considerable time in defensive roles and also gained valuable experience this past Spring.

"(Matt) Engle has played in every game (37) of his Sewanee career which is a testament to his hard work and determination. He has gotten better every year and has grown into becoming a very good player who can play in a number of roles. This year he will be asked to take more of a leadership role as a result of his experience," said Poggi.

"Walt (Doty) is a tough one-on-one defender who was given the duty of marking some of our opponents best attackers." He played in 14 games (missing the last four due to injury) and was voted to the 2009 SCAC Sportsmanship Team.

The other returnees who will look to solidify backline are Will Morgan, Mark Meyer, and Sam Koebley. (All three were plagued by injury throughout last season, but are very capable defenders who can help to initiate the attack from the back). Depending on their progress, Sophomore Alec Peter could also be called upon to anchor a fullback position.

"Alec played as a defensive midfielder for much of last season, but is comfortable going forward and could become a dangerous fullback," said Coach Poggi.

The Tigers added several freshmen on the defensive side who will push to play right away, especially Daniel Drewry, Joel Stewart, and Alex Hess.

Several upperclassmen will highlight an individually talented group of players. The experience and ability of seniors Patrick Johnson and Matt O'Brien to now mold this group into a cohesive unit will be a key factor for the Tigers this season. "Technically Pat and Matt are capable of orchestrating great things in the midfield," feels Poggi.

"Pat (Johnson) has a great engine and is capable of making something out of nothing on both sides of the ball. Matt (O'Brien) can also dictate the run of play and is capable of scoring important goals from distance," added Poggi. Together with Sophomore Stu Maxey and Junior Jackson Gannaway this returning group logged more games/minutes played, than any other position. Complimenting this experience, a strong group of freshmen midfielders will contribute (to this unit) right away. "In particular, Warner Hornsby, Watson Hartsoe, and Zack Goodwin will immediately make us more dynamic and give us the depth we've lacked," said Poggi.

Matt Lightfoot returns after a quality first year, which garnered him SCAC Player of the Week and All Conference honors. Lightfoot and Gannaway each found the back of the net five times, while Lightfoot added four assists which led the Tigers in points (His four assists tied him for ninth in the SCAC.)

"Matt is a handful for defenders having been one himself", said Poggi. "He knows what they don't like and has strength and skill to punish them as well. This year we have the personnel to give him some help."

Joining Lightfoot in attack will be Senior Henry Kiser who is comfortable playing with his back to goal while bringing others into the game with his passing. Two newcomers who will be counted on to bolster the Tigers frontline are (USC) transfer Garrett Schlosser and Freshmen Joe Garvey. "All three have the ability to turn a game with one kick of the ball," said Poggi.

It has become a staple of the Sewanee program to schedule one of the toughest schedules in the nation year-in and year-out. The 2009 season is no exception, and will feature nine challenging games at Puett Field "on the Mountain." A pair of games at Birmingham Southern College (BSC) Invitational against regional foes Mississippi College and Blackburn will kick-off the season. The home schedule will again be highlighted by the 20th Annual Kyle Rote Jr. Invitational, pitting Sewanee vs. Emory and Henry on Saturday Sept. 12 at 2:00 p.m. in the home opener. The Tigers will wrap up the tournament Sunday, Sept. 13 vs. Washington and Lee at 2:00 p.m. This year's tournament will renew a SCAC vs. ODAC rivalry with BSC playing in the double-header weekend.

2009 Preview Trinity University Tigers



The Trinity University Tigers lost four All-Americans to graduation, following the 2008 season.

"To lose four All-Americans is a devastating blow to any program, and to lose them all in one year is significant," said Head Coach Paul McGinlay, in his 19th year at Trinity's helm. "There were eight participants who guided the Tigers to a record of 81-5-2. With that many seniors gone, there will be a number of holes to fill in key positions. But, no Trinity team wants to be the one that didn't succeed. We have continually set high standards and hope to continue reaching them this year."

Under the leadership of Coach McGinlay, and third-year assistant Kelly Altman, the Tigers are preparing to bounce back and hope to be in the hunt once again.

The SCAC Championship propelled the Tigers to their 12th NCAA postseason tournament and seventh in a row. Trinity received an NCAA first-round bye and blanked the University of Texas-Tyler 2-0 in the second round, on the Tigers' field. The Tigers traveled to Swarthmore, Pa., for the third round and beat Ohio Wesleyan 2-1. Trinity advanced to its seventh quarterfinal round, and was edged 1-0 by Amherst.

For his efforts, coach McGinlay was named the NSCAA Central Region Coach of the Year for the sixth time. He also was elected SCAC Men's Coach of the Year for the 10th time.

Coach McGinlay also picked up his 300th career victory, in a 1-0 win on Nov. 1 against SCAC opponent Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas.

The 2008 campaign was certainly a stellar one for the Tigers, but it's time to move ahead to the current season.

According to coach McGinlay, the current squad, with eight returning starters, began to take shape on a team trip to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in March 2009.

"The birth of the new team took place at the famous Maracana Stadium," said coach McGinlay. "The new captains were elected. Our eyes are set on a run for the national championship, particularly since it will be in our hometown."

Coach McGinlay was referring to the NCAA Division III Men's and Women's Soccer Championships, slated for Dec. 4-5 at San Antonio's Blossom Soccer Stadium. Trinity is the host institution, and the San Antonio Sports Association is the organizing group.

The Tigers were NCAA champions in 2003 and runners-up in 2007. A number of returning players will make those realistic goals once again.

Senior goalkeeper Patrick Johnson of Houston (Memorial) —a team captain - was elected to the All-South Central Region Second Team and All-SCAC First Team. Johnson recorded 59 saves and had a .87 goals-against average. He is seventh in Tiger career saves (69) and No. 7 in goals-against average (.81).

Five returning players, including Johnson, were named to All-SCAC Teams.

Senior forward Ben Grossman of San Diego (La Costa Canyon), made the All-SCAC First Team. Grossman scored 13 goals (four game-winners) and dished out four assists for 30 points.

Three returnees were selected for the All-SCAC Second Team, including junior forward Cameron Hogsett of McKinney, Texas (McKinney). Hogsett scored 12 goals (three game-winners) and had seven assists for 31 points. Senior midfielder Joey DeCosta of Dallas (Lake Highlands) accounted for four goals and five assists, for 13 points. Alan Llobet, a senior defender from Missouri City, Texas (Elkins), and new team captain, scored three goals, with two game-winners. Llobet also had two assists and accrued eight points.

Sophomore midfielder Zach Garcia of Dallas, Texas (Lake Highlands) is returning for his second year with the Tigers, after starting every game last year at the base of the midfield. He will be joined in the midfield by fellow sophomore Aaron Olson of St. Paul, Minnesota (St. Paul's Academy), who suffered a season-ending injury prior to the first game last year. Junior defender Patrick Cunagin of College Station, Texas (A&M Consolidated), was also one of the three captains elected in Brazil.

A talented group of newcomers will also contribute greatly to the Tigers' championship quest.

Sophomore midfielder Nima Naderi of Carrollton, Texas (Creekview), transferred from Southern Methodist University. C.H. Farmer, a sophomore midfielder from Dallas (Lake Highlands), is a transfer from Xavier University. Andrew Soares of Houston, Texas () joins the Tigers from Florida Atlantic University. Junior transfer Eddie Bilbao of El Paso, Texas () and University of Incarnate Word, and sophomore Jayunta Majumdar of Albuquerque, New Mexico (Albuquerque Academy) and Santa Clara University will also join the Tigers this fall.

First-year forward Jeremy Gray of Columbus, Ohio (St. Francis DeSales), was selected the 2008 NSCAA National Scholar-Athlete of the Year. Also from Ohio (Galena) is goalkeeper Tim Nelin (Olentangy High School; Lewis Center, Ohio). Goalkeeper Michael Barbosa hails from Arlington, Mass. (Arlington).

Three outstanding Texans join the Tigers: midfielder Raz Forsten of Bellaire (Episcopal High School), forward Alan Castillejos of Odessa (Permian) and Michael Micheletti of Houston (Kingwood).

"We are very excited and enthusiastic about our incoming class," assistant coach Altman added. "They are all very talented young men, both on the field and off. It's a credit to Coach McGinlay and Trinity University that we're able to have student-athletes in our program who are players for today, as well as players for future years."
