Educational Psychology Major Course of Study

After graduating high school and joining the Hendrix campus in the fall of 2008, the three of us (Hannah Brown, Stacey Meaders and myself) knew we wanted to work with children. The program that we felt best suited our long-term goal was the Early Childhood Education major. We began taking all of the pre-requisite courses and developing an idea of how we might want to specialize in this field of study. The following spring, halfway through our Introduction to Early Childhood Education class, we became aware that the Early Childhood Education Department was suffering. The upperclassmen began scrambling to form a plan so they could still graduate as Early Childhood Education majors. Unfortunately, we knew that with future classes rapidly being cancelled, this would be impossible for us.

Through conferences with our advisors, we have enrolled in as many Early Childhood Education courses as possible to take over the next year. We have a profound interest in this area of study, and we feel that these classes are important for what we want to do after college, whether or not we are getting the "Early Childhood Education" title. The courses could not add up to the former requirements for a major or minor, and it is not in our best interest to take these courses if we should be taking courses that are required in our "new" major.

While considering our options, we decided that the field of Psychology correlates most appropriately with Early Childhood Education. Through our Intro to Early Childhood class, we learned that understanding childhood development is a key aspect in teaching.

We have devised a plan that combines upper-level Early Childhood Education courses and upper-level Psychology courses. We have done this with our 2008-2009 Course Catalog.

We are following the Psychology Major outline in which we will take the prerequisite courses (Statistics and Research Methods) and then five courses from the A (at
least one course), B (at least two courses) and C (at least one course) Psychology clusters.

The Psychology Department also requires that Psychology Majors take four elective
courses from the Psychology Department. However, we talked to the Psychology

Department about replacing these electives with our Early Childhood Education courses,
and they agreed that this would be in our best interest. At least five of the courses will be
either 300 or 400 level classes. In the Psychology Department, the Senior Capstone

Experience is decided upon during your junior year, and we will follow that course as if we
were entirely Psychology Majors. With other Interdisciplinary majors, it is discussed
whether or not there will be an influx of future students wanting to follow the newly
proposed major, but this major is only applicable to students who entered during the 20082009 school year.
