Asian Studies Program Student Assessment Plan

In keeping with the College's dedication to the cultivation of whole persons, the Asian Studies program provides opportunities for the interdisciplinary examination of one of the world's most significant regions. The program features a variety of Asia-focused courses in religion, philosophy, history, anthropology, politics, language, and literature that encourage students to investigate and appreciate the rich political, cultural, and intellectual traditions of this region from multiple disciplinary perspectives.

Learning Goals

Students earning a minor in Asian Studies will:

- 1) Cultivate knowledge of and appreciation for the rich and diverse cultural, intellectual, and linguistic traditions that have shaped Asia over time;
- 2) Develop skills, such as language competency, research skills, and/or critical thinking, that enable meaningful engagement with scholarship on Asia;
- 3) Explore, connect, and apply a variety of disciplinary approaches to the study of Asia;
- 4) Demonstrate a critical understanding of the coherence of "Asia" as a region and of its relationships to other parts of the world, past and present.

Assessment Tools

In order to assess the degree to which the program is achieving these goals, we employ a number of direct and indirect assessment tools.

- 1) Faculty evaluation of graduating Asian Studies minors (Direct): Two or more program faculty members from different disciplines will complete an evaluation form for identified seniors graduating with a minor in Asian Studies indicating the degree to which each faculty member feels that student has achieved the program learning goals.
- 2) Faculty assessment of papers written by Asian Studies minors in 300-level program courses (Direct): Each year, two or more Asian Studies faculty members will assess papers written by Asian Studies minors in qualifying 300-level courses according to a rubric based on the program learning goals.
- 3) Course Assessment Audit/Curriculum Map (Indirect): Program faculty will indicate the degree to which each of their courses emphasizes each of the program learning goals.
- 4) Senior Exit Survey (Indirect): Program faculty will survey identified Asian Studies minors during their final semester at Hendrix about their perceptions of their achievement of the program learning goals.
