Heifer International is an international not-for-profit organization that uses social, cultural, economic, political, and ecological methods in poverty ridden communities to create a system of plant and animal production practices that satisfy by human food needs and the needs of the environment. It is my hope that with a Social Justice and Sustainability major, I will have the educational background to contribute to the efforts of organizations similar to Heifer International in order to address the national and international food crisis with sustainable

practices I intend to create the foundation for the educational background through taking social/cultural courses, economic/political/historical courses, and ecological courses. Dr. Capek will grade my senior thesis.
