 - The Spanish Program has restructured its major and minor, has added many courses and deleted others (in part due to staffing change), and have revamped individual courses to better fit our current population of students.

 - The changes in the major and minor were inspired by a study of Spanish majors, the courses they chose to take, and departmental conversation. It became clear that we would benefit by adding more structure to our major for guidance. Achieving departmental goals for students

Program goals: The mission of the Spanish program at Hendrix College is twofold: to give the students the opportunity to learn the language and to introduce them to the academic and cultural richness of the Hispanic world through the analytical study of major texts. Towards this end, the Spanish program is geared towards educating students so they can:

- communicate effectively in Spanish, both written and oral,
- understand and analyze different types of text in Spanish,
- be culturally aware and sensitive through constant engagement with the cultural products of others, therefore becoming better global citizens, and
- have a wide base of knowledge about Hispanic cultures and literary traditions.

Our first three learning goals, which focus on communication, comprehension, analysis, and engagement, are what we do in every single class in our curriculum. The fourth learning goal, which focuses on have a wide base of knowledge of cultures and traditions within the Hispanic world, can easily be achieved through any of the survey courses, SPAN 310, 320, or 330. Because there is very little overlap between the content of classes, the fourth learning goal can also be achieved by taking more than one course at the 300 or 400 level.

• What role does your Capstone play in achieving your departmental learning goals? How do you know that students are achieving these goals through the Capstone experience?

Through our Senior Comprehensive Exam, which is specifically tailored to each student based on the course work that they have done, we gauge how well the students have captured the major points taught in each of the classes. It also allows us to see what courses students have chosen during their time within the major. This has pushed us to restructure the major in order to assure a more diverse spread of courses and it has enabled us to change individual courses to better suit our pedagogical desires.

We work with our students in individual courses to assure that they use the resources available to the best of their abilities. This differs greatly depending on course.
