This film is about a family's and a nation's effort to survive and about the political indifference of the international community with regards to the systematic extermination of 500,000 Tutsis by Hutu Interahamwe militia in Rwanda in 1994.

Joseph Sebarenzi: "A Message of Peace and Reconciliation"

Joseph Sebarenzi, Ph.D., former head of the Rwanda Parliament, has endured tragedy most of us cannot fathom. He lost his parents, seven siblings, and numerous other relatives in the Rwandan genocide of 1994. Yet, years later, as a senior government official in a position to exact revenge, he instead pushed for peace and reconciliation. "Revenge is like adding guilt to victimhood," says Sebarenzi. "It solves nothing. At some point, we have to ignore the past and envision the future."

Medical Program Panel

Innocent Nsabimana and Bosco Ndemeye: "Life of a Teenager in Rwanda"

Innocent and Bosco will look at the daily life of a teenager in terms of his/her education, religion, family and social life in Rwanda.

Revis Edmonds: "A Red State Arises: How a Gubernatorial Race Transformed Arkansas and National Politics"

The gubernatorial race of 1990 brought two of the state's most prominent politicos, Sheffield Nelson and Tommy Robinson, into one of Arkansas's most bitter political battles—and it also signaled the state's turn toward the Republican Party. We go behind the scenes to uncover the relationships, personalities, and traditions that produced a famous Arkansas political rivalry and ushered in a historic shift in its politics.

Alan Elrod and Phillip Spivey: "The Fake News Hour: Middle East Peace in 50 Minutes"

Throughout the summer, we'll be having conversations with AGS faculty about important issues that are often misrepresented or misunderstood. This time, Phillip Spivey discusses Israel, Palestine, and Middle East politics.

Jim Rush: "Mindfulness Experience"

Introduction to stress management based upon mindfulness meditation to manage stress emotionally and physically.

Wesley Beal ('99): "How to Visualize a Text: An Introduction to the Digital Humanities"

What happens when an English professor uses this one weird trick to have a computer "read" a novel for him? You won't believe what happens next.

Kim Bertschy: "An Introduction to Privacy and Cybersecurity"

The technology we use every day makes our lives easier and more entertaining. However, the information footprint we leave behind can have devastating consequences for privacy and our personal identities. Data breaches and hacking highlight the need to protect sensitive data from thieves and maintain privacy. Unfortunately, technology design, laws, and business policies do not inherently protect privacy and it is virtually impossible to be anonymous on the internet. In this session we will discuss principles of privacy and cybersecurity that will help individuals protect their data and privacy. Some of the questions to be addressed include: Why should you care about privacy? Could people figure out who you are if you didn't post using your real name? Could someone use information about you online to figure out things about you that aren't online? Does what happen on the Internet stay on the Internet? How could someone hack your accounts? What is encryption, and how is it used?

Jessica McClard ('92): "The Little Free Pantry Project

I will speak about my inspiration for the pilot project, initiative growth/community organizing/social movements, and next steps informed by Lean Startup methodology.

John McGraw ('87): "Radical? Militant? Librarianship!"

Libraries exist to provide vetted information to their communities, but increasingly play vital roles in insuring people have access to tools and communities and spaces. What is the value of providing a platform for odious opinions, or giving a voice to marginalized communities? Does information want to be free?

Jeremy Lusk ('04): "Exploding Stars and Colonies on Mars"

The iron in your blood was forged in the heart of a dying star. The same iron, from the same dying star, makes the planet Mars appear red. Facts like these are what keep me excited about studying physics. But how do we know this stuff? Who figured it out? What's left to discover? In this presentation, I will share with you the story of how scientists like you and me from around the globe work together to discover astonishing facts about the origin and fate of our universe. I will also share our prospects for making humanity a multi-planetary species. Come with your burning space questions. There will be plenty of time for Q&A.

Kacey Hight ('10): "EpiPen Costs How Much?: A Behind the Scenes Look at Drug Pricing Among U.S Pharmaceutical Companies"

Recently there has been a lot more talk surrounding drug pricing with headlines that include names like EpiPen, Valeant, and Martin Shkreli. Sometimes it can be difficult to figure out what a fair price for a drug is and when a price hike may be justified. This seminar will set out to explain the FDA approval process, look at high-profile price gauging cases, and ultimately give us some tools to discuss drug pricing among U.S. pharmaceutical companies- a problem that is sure not to go away any time soon.

John Andrews ('05): "Colin is Changing His Name"

John Andrew (AGS '05) will read from his first book of poetry. "Colin Is Changing His Name", which was released last month from sibling Rivalry Press, and was a finalist for the 2015 Moon City Poetry Prize.

Warren Sconiers: "Introduction to Dahn-koon-do"

Dahn-koon-do is a Korean Martial Art that adds grappling and hand strikes to Tae-kwon-do. Warren Sconiers has a blackbelt in Tae-kwon-do and Dahn-koon-do. No prior experience needed and no sparring will happen.

Andrea Lively: "Thanking Henrietta: Acknowledging the Legacy of HeLa Cells"

Henrietta Lacks was an African-American woman who underwent treatment for an aggressive form of cervical cancer at Johns Hopkins Hospital in 1951. Although Mrs. Lacks died from this cancer at the age of 31, her tumor cells, called HeLa cells, remarkably continued to reproduce in the laboratory, forming the first immortal human cell line and playing a crucial role in countless

scientific discoveries. This talk will focus on the ways in which the biomedical establishment, and Johns Hopkins in particular, has responded to this important but ethically complex legacy.

Mark Elrod: The Guiding Hand

A short documentary film that paints a less-than flattering portrait of Arkansas Governor's School as well as former Arkansas Governor Bill Clinton's attempt to reshape Arkansas' education system along the AGS model. The discussion to follow will explore the factual and logical fallacies found in the film in its attempt to discredit AGS and presidential candidate Bill Clinton.

Winston Meyer: "Writing Your Own Script: You, Professionalism, and Social Media"
