CLASS OF 2028

BY THE NUMBERS

Hendrix welcomed 340 new students to campus on Move-in Day, Tuesday, August 20. The Hendrix Class of 2028 has **16%** more students than the previous year's entering class, with the new students selected from among **3,165** applications submitted — the highest number of applicants in Hendrix history.

Following a week of orientation activities, fall semester classes began on August 27.

- Average GPA: 3.76 Average ACT composite score: 27
- **48** first-generation college students, just over **30%** are members of underrepresented groups
- **54%** of first-year students are from Arkansas; **14** other states are represented including Texas, Oklahoma, and Tennessee
- International countries represented are Bangladesh, Colombia, Kenya, United Arab Emirates, and the United Kingdom
- More than one-third (**34%**) of new students are Pell Grant recipients
- **Twenty-three** new students have a parent, sibling, or other relative who previously attended Hendrix
- Domestically, the longest new student trip to campus was 1,443 miles, from Diamond Bar, California; Internationally, the longest was 8,429 miles. Others made local moves, with 24 students from Conway choosing Hendrix.

Hendrix College has received a \$4.6 million bequest from the estate of forward-thinking alumnus, former board member, and loyal supporter, the late **Dr. William "Bill" Roberts '65** of Conway. The bequest — one of the largest estate gifts in Hendrix's history — will be used to invest in new academic and co-curricular initiatives that support the College's residential liberal arts mission through the previously established Dr. William "Bill" Roberts Innovation Endowment Fund.

A longtime Hendrix donor, Roberts used this bequest to further reflect his passion for the College and the education he received, which prepared him for a career as a physician and a life of engaged citizenship.

After Hendrix, Roberts attended the University of Arkansas at Little Rock for Medical Sciences School of Medicine, where he became licensed as a Doctor of Internal Medicine and received a Fellow in Cardiology certificate. He continued his medical career in the U.S. Army and received the Department of Defense Joint Service Commendation Medal in 1972 for meritorious service as a medical officer.

In 1974, Roberts opened his private practice in Conway, faithfully serving Conway area residents and generously supporting many charitable organizations in the community for nearly a half century. A Hendrix College Board of Trustees member for 12 years, Roberts advised pre-med students at Hendrix and served in a volunteer supervisory role for health care on campus for many years.

Though the gift was initially anonymous, the Brightons invited the Chappells to lunch on campus to reveal themselves as the donors.

JOHN HOLLEMAN, III FUNDS ATHLETIC DIRECTOR OF DEVELOPMENT

Hendrix College is excited to announce a generous gift from John Holleman III, a dedicated supporter and parent of a current student-athlete, to fund the inaugural Director of Development for Athletics position. This gift will underwrite the role for its first few years, marking a critical step in the College's efforts to strengthen relationship-building and fundraising efforts for Warriors Athletics.

Holleman's gift is a reflection of his family's deep ties to Hendrix and their belief in the value of athletics in shaping well-rounded students. Their family legacy at Hendrix can be traced back to 1891, when the College's records show John B. Holleman, great-great-grandfather of John III, was enrolled as a student. John III's father, John T. Holleman Jr. '51, played football at Hendrix, as did his grandfather, John T. Holleman Sr., who graduated from Hendrix in 1923. Now John III's son, Josh Holleman '27, plays football for the Warriors.

"Given our family's historical connection with Hendrix, it was the least we could do to make this investment in athletics," said Holleman. "Josh and I need every blessing we can get in our lives, and I've never failed to receive blessings back at least tenfold on every dollar I've contributed to a good cause like Hendrix Athletics."

HENDRIX ATHLETICS RETURN TO SCAC IN 2025

Hendrix College has announced that it will <u>return to the Southern</u> <u>Collegiate Athletic Conference</u> (SCAC) beginning in fall 2025. Hendrix was previously a member of the SCAC from 1992 to 2012.

The SCAC strategically aligns with the geographic region of Hendrix College's student enrollment, student-athlete recruitment, and alumni base. Most of the other SCAC member schools are also in close proximity to Hendrix.

George and Sallie Gill of Barrington, Illinois, are generously supporting the College's pre-law program in honor of their brother and brother-in-law, John Gill. This generous contribution will officially rename the program as the John Gill Pre-Law Program at Hendrix College.

John Gill, a distinguished attorney and revered figure in the Arkansas legal community, dedicated his 60-year career to the pursuit of justice and public service. A Hendrix alumnus and graduate of Vanderbilt University School of Law, Gill held numerous esteemed positions, including President of the Arkansas Bar Association and membership in the American College of Trial Lawyers. As Senior Counsel at the Little Rock law firm Gill Ragon Owen, P.A., his unwavering commitment to legal excellence and ethical leadership has shaped Arkansas's legal landscape and inspired countless aspiring lawyers.

The newly established John Gill Pre-Law Program Endowed Fund will be managed by Hendrix College to enhance opportunities for students aspiring to enter law school or pursue careers benefiting from a legal education.

Hendrix's pre-law program boasts an 87% law school acceptance rate, with students scoring above the national average on the LSAT. This endowment will provide enhanced resources and opportunities for students, further strengthening their preparation for careers in law and leadership roles in related fields.

CREDITED WITH EARLY WORK ON CANCER DRUG

Dr. John C. Byrd, Hendrix Class of 1987, and his mentor, retired Hendrix College Professor of Chemistry Dr. Thomas E. Goodwin, are named as collaborators among the many researchers involved in the discovery and development of a particular dihydroorotate dehydrogenase (DHODH) inhibitor used in the treatment of cancer.

Byrd, who is now at the University of Cincinnati, previously conducted research at OSUCC – James. He has become known worldwide as a specialist in hematologic malignancies, and his laboratory's summer research interns have included Hendrix undergraduate students for many years. Byrd has remained an active Hendrix alumnus; he received a Hendrix Odyssey Medal in 2015 and currently serves on the Board of Trustees.

As a Hendrix student in the 1980s, Byrd benefited from what Hendrix students still experience today: a high level of one-on-one mentoring alongside undergraduate research opportunities that are a hallmark of small liberal arts colleges. Many Hendrix alumni like Byrd cultivate ongoing relationships with professors like Goodwin, continuing to make a positive difference in their own lives as they focus their work on changing the world for the better.

2024 ODYSSEY MEDALISTS

The Odyssey Medal is presented to alumni whose life achievements exemplify the ideals of the Hendrix Odyssey Program.
