

Jim Evans enters his third season at the helm of the Hendrix College women's soccer team. Evans finished his first two years with a 17-17 overall record and has transformed the Warriors into a conference contender.

Evans led a 2009 program that set numerous school records, including a tie for most wins in a season (10-7 overall). The Warriors set new program marks with just 13 goals allowed in a season and seven goals scored in a game (twice). Evans also had five players set new individual records in 2009, including junior keeper Allison Mosley's seven shutouts.

His 2008 squad finished with a 7-10 mark. He guided one player (Abby Blaney '09) to SCAC All-Sportsmanship Team honors and finished with the team's most wins since the 2005 season.



Evans has coached collegiate soccer for over 30 years and came to Hendrix after a two-year stint as the Simsbury High School (Simsbury, Conn.) head women's coach. His Simsbury team made it to the State Finals in 2007 and were League Champions in 2006.

Evans owns an extensive NCAA Division I coaching career as well. He served as the head men's coach at the University of Hartford for 12 seasons (1993-04) and accumulated 108 wins (second all-time in program hisotry). Evans

made two NCAA Tournament appearances (1996 and 1999) and reached the Elite Eight in 1996. He guided the Hawks to five American East Conference (AEC) Postseason Tournaments and won the AEC Championship in 1999. Evans holds the record for most wins in a season at Hartford, with 17 victories in 1996. He coached four All Americans, two AEC Player-of-the-Year winners and 18 All-AEC First Team winners.

Prior to Evans' position at Hartford, he coached the Thomas College men's soccer team from 1986-93. He quided three league championship teams ('88, '89, '90) and one

NAIA District-V Championship squad in 1988.

Evans held numerous assistant coaching positions from 1978-85, including the University of Connecticut, Salisbury State College and George Mason University.

Evans was a standout performer for the University of Connecticut Huskies. He captained an 18-2-2 team his senior year and was a three-year letterwinner for the Huskies. Evans was a key member of a UConn squad that made four-straight NCAA Tournament appearances and made it to the



NCAA Quarterfinals in 1974 and 1976. He was named to the National Soccer Coaches Association of America All New England/Northeast Team in 1975 and 1976, and New England Intercollegiate Soccer League All-Star Team in 1975 and 1976. Evans ranks 21st on the Huskies' all-time scoring list with 61 career points (21 goals, 19 assists) and ended his collegiate career with a 65-13-8 overall record.

Evans received his bachelor's in Physical Education in 1978 from the University of Connecticut. He resides in Conway, Ark. with his wife Irma and son Ian, who is a junior defender for the Warriors. Evans' daughter Amanda graduated from the University of Hartford in 2007.







Ben Parman enters his third as the men's and women's soccer assistant. Parman was hired in the summer of 2008 and has made an immediate impact on the men's and women's programs.

Parman specializes in coaching the Warrior goalkeepers, as he was a four-year letterwinner and standout goalkeeper for head coach Doug Mello during his four seasons with Luther College. Over the past seasons, his goalkeepers have consistently ranked among conference leaders in goals against average, total saves, save percentage, and saves per game. He guided standout keeper Allison Mosley to All-SCAC Second Team honors in 2009.

On a prestigious list of Norse keepers, Parman ranks fifth all-time with a 1.08 career goals against average and seventh all-time with eight career shutouts. He posted great numbers as a starter his junior year with a .835 save percentage (4th in IIAC), 76 saves (5th in IIAC), 1.10 goals against average (5th in IIAC) and five shutouts (5th in IIAC). Parman ended his four-year collegiate career with just 23 goals against, 113 saves, eight shutouts and an 8-8-1 overall record in over

Parman earned his bachelor's in Business Management with an emphasis in Sports Management from Luther in May of 2008. He is an active member of the National Soccer Coaches Association of America and holds a National D Coaching License.

Parman also coaches locally in Conway with the Arkansas Rush Soccer Club as the Director of Coaching for Goalkeepers, and also with the Arkansas Olympic Development Program as the State Goalkeeping Coach.




History of the SCAC

The Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC) celebrates its 25th Anniversary in 2010-11 with countless memories of a proud and storied past and visions of an exciting future.

The SCAC was founded and began operation on September 1, 1962, as the College Athletic Conference (CAC). The league's first primary mark is pictured on the left.

Centre College of Danville, Kentucky; Southwestern at Memphis (Tennessee) (now known as Rhodes College); The University of the South of Sewanee, Tennessee; and



Following membership changes throughout the 1970s and 1980s, the conference went through restructuring and renaming. With the addition of Millsaps College of Jackson, Mississippi, and Trinity University of San Antonio, Texas, in 1988 and Hendrix College of Conway, Arkanasas, and Oglethorpe University of Atlanta, Georgia, in 1991, membership reached a then all-time high of eight.



That same year (1991), the conference renamed itself the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference, hired its first full-time commissioner

- Stephen P. Argo - and a permanent conference office was established in

Atlanta, Georgia. As part of restructuring, the league also adopted its current primary mark (pictured right) and adopted blue (pms 287) and gold (pms 131) as the official colors of the conference.

Membership changes continued throughout the '90s. The SCAC added Southwestern University of Georgetown, Texas, in 1993 with participation beginning in the 1994-95 academic year. In 1997-98, the SCAC added both DePauw University of Greencastle, Indiana, and Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology of Terre Haute, Ind., with participation beginning in 1998-99.

As part of a year-long celebration in 2005-06, the league celebrated its 15th anniversary as the restructured SCAC. The league adopted a special anniversary logo (pictured left) and as part of the celebration, 15th anniversary teams were selected for all conference sponsored sports.

After Rose-Hulman announced its intentions to leave the conference, Austin College and Colorado College were confirmed as the 10th and 11th members of the league in 2006 with participation beginning in the 2006-07 academic year.

Birmingham-Southern College of Birmingham, Alabama, a former member of the Division I Big South Conference, was approved as the 12th member of the SCAC and began play in 2007-08.

On the national athletics stage, the SCAC has had its fair share of success - both in terms of team championships (six) and individual championships (19).

SCAC Academic Profile

The SCAC and its member institutions are committed to maintaining high academic standards. The member institutions are committed to the principle that a quality college athletics program is beneficial to the well-being of an institution in that it benefits the entire campus community as well as the student-athletes.

With 11 of the 12 member institutions maintaining Phi Beta Kappa chapters (Hendrix included) on their campuses, the SCAC boasts some of the most prestigious colleges and universities in the nation. SCAC schools are consistently ranked among the top 50 colleges and universities in the nation in such respected publications as Barron's, Peterson's, Princeton Review and National Review College Guide.



In exclusive voting by the head women's soccer coaches of the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC), Trinity University reaped the awards of an undefeated regular season as a representative from the conference champion Tigers won or shared every major award selected for the 2009 season.

Trinity's Brianna Young won a share of the SCAC Offensive Player-of-the-Year award — splitting the vote with co-winner Leslie Robichaux of Millsaps College. Danika Wright of Trinity was voted the SCAC Defensive Player-of-the-Year. In the same balloting, the Tigers' Lindsay Euers was tabbed the league's Newcomer-of-the-Year and her head coach, Lance Key, was voted SCAC Women's Coach-of-the-Year.

Brianna Young, a senior forward from Rockville Centre, N.Y., led the league in scoring during the regular season with 14 goals and nine assists for 37 points, including a league-high six game-winners. The 14 goals scored by Young represent the most in a single-season by any conference women's player since the 2006 season. A two-time SCAC Offensive Player-of-the-Week selection this season, Young is the fifth Trinity player in the last seven years to earn at least a share of the league's Offensive Player-of-the-Year award.

Leslie Robichaux, a senior midfielder from Geismar, La., was right behind Young in SCAC scoring, finishing the season with 13 goals and six assists for 32 points. She led the league in shots with 87 and was second in game-winners with five. Robichaux's 13 goals rank second-most in a Millsaps single-season while her 31 career goals are third and 75 career points are fourth in program history — despite playing just three seasons. Robichaux is the first Millsaps player — man or woman — to receive a SCAC postseason Player-of-the-Year soccer honor. Young and Robichaux were the only nominees to receive votes in the Offensive POTY balloting as both received five votes each.

Danika Wright, a junior defender from Alpine, Utah, captained a very young Trinity defensive unit that conceded only four goals this season — the second-fewest goals any SCAC women's team has allowed during a regular season. Wright also chipped in offensively with four goals and two assists for 10 points. A two-time all-SCAC selection, Wright was the SCAC Defensive Player-of-the-Week in Weeks 6 and 10. Wright received eight votes in the Defensive POTY voting.

Lindsay Euers, a first-year midfielder from Austin, Texas, had two goals this season — both in conference play which included the game-winner against Southwestern University. As a result of a pre-season injury to a returning starter, Euers filled in and didn't relinquish her position. Since 2001, she is the fifth player from Trinity to earn the league's Newcomer-of-the-Year award. Teammate Abigail Loar won the award last season.

Lance Key, in his sixth-year as head coach at Trinity, led the Tigers to their second perfect regular season with a 16-0-0 overall record. Trinity won its 14th SCAC champion-ship - the fourth under coach Key's leadership - with an 8-0-0 conference mark. Key received eight votes from his peers in the COTY voting. Jim Evans of Hendrix and Paul Van Hooydonk of Millsaps received one vote each.

Hendrix Athletic Facilities Ranked 13th in Nation by Princeton Review

Hendrix College has always been considered one of the country's best institutions for undergraduate education, however, according to the Princeton Review the Warriors' three-year-old athletic facilities ranks among the best in the nation.

The Princeton Review recently praised Hendrix College for its new Wellness and Athletic Center, Bob Courtway Pool and four outdoor playing fields by ranking it 13th in the country among all 2,500 four-year colleges. That includes all NCAA Division I, II and III schools.

Hendrix joined Wabash College (Crawfordsville, Ind.) and Middlebury College (Middlebury, Vt.) as the only other NCAA Division III schools to make the Top 20 list. Hendrix was also the only Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC) school on the list.

The Warriors finished construction of their new athletic facilities in August of 2007. The new buildings and playing fields replaced the 46-year-old Grove Gymnasium. Hendrix has also recently finished construction of the new Student Life and Technology Center, which has been erected on the west side of Harkrider where Grove Gymnasium formerly sat.

"Our new athletic facilities have helped us, along with the great work of our coaching staff, to increase the number of student-athletes participating in our 19 sports from about 180 a few years ago to over 350 this year," said Athletics Director Danny Powell.

The SCAC has given Hendrix the opportunity to show off its new state-of-the-art facilities by appointing the school as host of the 2008 and 2009 SCAC Men's and Women's Basketball Championships, 2009 SCAC Field Hockey Championships, 2010 SCAC Softball Championships and 2010 SCAC Outdoor Track & Field Championships.

The SCAC has chosen Hendrix as a host school for its conference championships because of the central location in the conference, ability to run on-campus tournaments and the abundant hotels and restaurants Conway has to offer.

One of the greatest aspects of Hendrix Athletics is the affordable admission to its 19 sporting event's home games throughout the year, including SCAC Championships. Fans can come out and enjoy all the fun and excitement of college athletics for the best price of all, FREE.

In its profile on Hendrix (pages 280-281), The Princeton Review praises the college for its involved student body and accepting atmosphere. Hendrix students are quoted extensively throughout the review, discussing everything from the "phenomenal [financial] aid that would be ridiculous to turn down" to the "awesome theme parties". A political science major noted that "one of Hendrix's selling points is the personal relationships that students build with their professors," while another student credited professors for being "courageously friendly."

The Princeton Review's 62 ranking lists in The Best 371 Colleges are entirely based on its survey of 122,000 students (about 325 per campus on average) attending the colleges in the book. The 80-question survey asks students to rate their schools on several topics and report on their campus experiences. Topics range from student assessments of their professors, administrators, financial aid, and campus food.

Other ranking lists are based on student reports about their student body's political leanings, race/class relations, gay community acceptance, and other aspects of campus life. A college's appearance on a ranking list is entirely the result of a high consensus among its surveyed students about a topic compared with that of students at other schools answering the same survey question(s) on the ranking list topic.

Warrior Field was constructed throughout 2006 and 2007. Warrior Field holds a capacity crowd of approximately 500 bleacher seats with plenty of room for lawn chairs and blankets surrounding the field. The pitch features stadium style lighting with one of the greatest playing surfaces in the South. The Warriors have a strong contingent of fans that come out for support as Hendrix College ranked 24th in the nation in total home attendance (3,204) and 30th in average home attendance (291) during the 2009 season.

The Hendrix Motto

"Unto the whole person" The Hendrix seal appeared for the first time on the cover of the 1898 catalog. The seal included the College's motto, selected by a committee headed by the Rev. George W. Hill and taken from a passage in Ephesians: "Till we all come in the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ ..." (Ephesians 4:13, King James Version). Currently translated as "unto the whole person," the motto, in Ancient Greek, reflects Hendrix's dedication to both Christian principles and the traditional liberal arts ideal.



National Recognition

Hendrix has a long and proud tradition of national recognition. As early as 1900 Hendrix was recognized by the U.S. Office of Education as having higher standards for admission and graduation than any other institution of higher learning in Arkansas. That recognition continues today as numerous journals and college guides recognize

the impact of Your Hendrix Odyssey: Engaging in Active Learning on American higher education.

Fiske Guide to Colleges names Hendrix one of 44 national "Best Buy" colleges and universities in its 2010 edition. Hendrix is one of only 24 private institutions on the list.

and top "100 Best Buy" lists for 2009. Hendrix is ranked #71 on the "Best Private Colleges" list and is #81 on the "Overall" list. Hendrix is one of only 23 schools that made both the top "100 Best Colleges" and top "100 Best Buy" lists.

U.S. News & World Report lists Hendrix as the #1 "Upand-coming Liberal Arts College" in its 2010 list of best colleges. Hendrix is also ranked 80th on the magazine's list of best liberal arts colleges.

The Princeton Review

The Princeton Review lists Hendrix for academic excellence in its 2008 college guide, The Best 366 Colleges. Hendrix was among the top 20 colleges recognized in these four categories: 11th in the "professors get high marks" category, 11th in the "best classroom experience" category, 16th in the "best college theater" category, and 20th in the "lots of race/class interaction."

Hendrix is also listed in The Princeton Review's 2008 edition of American's Best Value Colleges noting the fact that Hendrix costs about 10 percent less than several comparable schools around the country.

In the 2010 edition, Best 371 Colleges, Hendrix is ranked fifth "Easiest Campus to Get Around" and 13th "Best Athletic Facilities."

Colleges That Change Lives

Colleges That Change Lives once again selects Hendrix for inclusion in its latest guidebook edition, "40 Schools that will Change the Way You Think About Colleges."

Former New York Times education editor Loren Pope wrote the guidebook to help students, parents and counselors find a good college match. The book profiles colleges that make a real difference in the lives of students. The choices in the book were based on Pope's years of research as a journalist, as well as his direct interaction with students and graduates of the CTCL schools. The 40 colleges he evaluates are known for their abilities to serve students with a wide range of abilities yet produce higher proportions of scientists and scholars.





In summing up his reason for selecting Hendrix, which has a nine-page profile in the book, Pope writes: "I was unexpectedly blown away by Hendrix. It is an exemplary college and teenagers of a wide range of abilities and interests would find this a very happy fit socially. . . The New York-based education services company features Hendrix in its 2006 edition of its book, America's Best Value Colleges. The guide profiles 81 colleges with outstanding academics, generous financial aid packages and relatively low costs. It includes public and private colleges and universities in 35 states. Hendrix is the only college in Arkansas featured on the list.

History in Brief

In 1876 Central Institute, which was to become Hendrix College

was established in Altus, Arkansas, by the Rev. Isham L. Burrow.

The school became Central Collegiate Institute in 1881 with the addition of secondary and collegiate departments.

The institute was purchased in 1884 by conferences of the Southern Methodist Church in Arkansas and was renamed Hendrix College in honor of Bishop Eugene R. Hendrix in 1889. The following year the college moved to Conway, Arkansas.

By the mid-1930s Hendrix had firmly established its role as a small, coeducational, undergraduate, residential, liberal arts, church-related institution.

From the mid-1950s Hendrix gradually increased student enrollment until it stabilized at just under 1,000 in the 1970s. Through the end of the 20th century, Hendrix added more than 15 buildings, developed a new master plan for growth of the campus, and revised and enhanced its curriculum and added faculty in key areas.

The College's long-standing commitment to experiential education gave birth to the Hendrix Odyssey Program in 2005. This component of the curriculum, which requires three engaged learning experiences of every Hendrix graduate, is helping the College build a national reputation for leadership in engaged learning.

From the foundation of more than 130 years of excellence in education, Hendrix College is moving confidently into the 21st century.
