
Language study through travel and immersion

International Summer School in Taipei + RAUL CONTRERAS












Independent Translation Project



Hendrix-Murphy funding enabled her to take a **Spanish Intensive Training Course** alongside her field work. This "boot camp" in Spanish that increased her speaking proficiency and enhanced her capacity to advance in her chosen work.


Laela created a literary anthology that brought together creative writing by Hendrix students, alumni, and faculty that focused on religious exploration.

♦ BROOKE NELSON






Internship at First Class Communications JOY SPENCE
